Regatta History

The first race was proposed to the Nauti-Skippers Boat Club board by Mary Ann Redman, who was their Commodore in 1994. It was accepted by the Board and the membership. The first race had only the Nauti-Skippers participating. The race was well publicized and was attended by a large crowd, many from other boating clubs. After the race, one of the boating clubs, the Merry Mariners, challenged the Nauti-Skippers to see which club could build the fastest boat the following year. The third year the Cardboard Boat Race was opened to any boat club in the area. This event was, for several years, organized and conducted by the Nauti-Skippers.

In 2002 the races almost ended until a committee, composed of members of participating clubs, was formed and they planned and ran the races. The races were strictly noncommercial, and no entry was permitted outside funding or advertising to be used or placed on any boat.







From that humble beginning, the races continued through 2004 with participation limited to boating clubs in the area. As the spectator interest grew and the boating clubs interest waned, more organizations were asking if they could participate in this fun event. In each of the past three years, the races drew over 2,000 spectators to the Yacht Club Beach to view the event.

In 2004, at the urging of Bill Shallbetter, the head of the Cardboard Boat Race Committee at that time, the committee voted to turn the event over to a local service organization so they could expand the event and open it up to more participants. This in turn could raise some money for the service organization.

Shallbetter, who is a member of the Rotary Club of Cape Coral, proposed that the club take over the event as one of the club's projects. The club accepted the challenge and in doing so, made some changes. The first change was to rename the event to the Cape Coral Cardboard Boat Regatta. So, in 2005, the regatta was moved to Seahawk Park in Cape Coral and the date was changed from July to May. The move from the Yacht Club Beach was necessary so the club could make some money by selling food and beverages. This also allowed the regatta to expand and made it easier for spectators to find ample parking without the need for a shuttle from a remote location.


Fun And Interesting Ideas For Celebrating Earth Day

At that time, Bob Gaglio took over as chairman of the Regatta Committee and made additional changes. A Friday night event was added where people could preview the boats, listen to live entertainment and have dinner. This move was such a success we have continued to hold the event at Four Freedoms Park.

Gaglio moved to Sarasota after the 2010 Regatta at which time Jim Perry took over as chairman of the committee. Jim continues to do an excellent job as chairman as the regatta grows in boat builder participation and audience each year. In 2011 we tried to enhance the event by adding "The Dock Dogs" as a special attraction. However, we decided to not continue using them after the first year.

2012 was one of the few years where the weather was not on our side. We had rain showers threaten us all day, which did keep many people away from the event. But the people who chose to brave the weather were treated

to a very fun event as boat builders raced their boats in heated competitions to claim first place in one of the many racing heats we ran during the day.



Tax Talk

How To Know It's Really The IRS Calling Or Knocking On Your Door

Many taxpayers have encountered individuals impersonating IRS



The IRS initiates most contacts through regular mail delivered by the United States Postal Service.

There are special circumstances in which the IRS will call or come to a home or business but will first send several letters from the IRS in the mail.

The IRS Does Not

- Call to demand immediate payment using a specific payment method such as a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire transfer. Generally, the IRS will first mail a bill to any taxpayer who owes taxes.
- Demand that you pay taxes without the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe.

• Threaten to bring in local police, immigration officers or other law enforcement to have you arrested for not paying.

Here Is What The IRS Will Do

If an IRS representative visits you, he or she will always provide two forms of official credentials called a pocket commission and a government issued HSPD-12 card. You have the right to see these credentials.

Collection

IRS collection employees may call or come to a home or business unannounced to collect a tax debt. They will not demand that you make an immediate payment to a source other than the U.S. Treasury.

The IRS can assign certain cases to private debt collectors but only after giving the taxpayer and his or her representative, if one is appointed, written notice.

Audits

IRS employees conducting audits may call taxpayers to set up appointments or to discuss items, but not without having first attempted to notify them by mail.

Criminal Investigations

IRS criminal investigators may visit a taxpayer's home or business unannounced while investigating. However, these are federal law enforcement agents, and they will not demand any sort of payment.

Beware Of Impersonations

Scams take many shapes and forms, such as phone calls, letters and emails. Many IRS impersonators use threats to intimidate and bully people into paying a fabricated tax bill or giving their Social Security number. They may even threaten to arrest or deport their would-be victim if the victim doesn't comply.

So, What's The Deal With "Home Warranties"?

When big things in your home break – like your dishwasher or air conditioning system – they can cost lots of money to fix. Some people buy "home warranties" (which are really service contracts) to help cover these costs. But what exactly is a so-called home warranty?

There are different types and options depending on the company and amount you pay, but home warranties typically cover replacements and repairs for things like appliances or air conditioning systems. They last for a set amount of time and – unlike builder warranties for new homes, or warranties included with some products – they cost extra.

And after looking at the details, you may find that a home warranty duplicates coverage you already have, or covers only part of a product, or makes it nearly impossible to get repairs done when you need them.

So here are some things to think about before committing to a home warranty:

Is it likely to save you money? Consider both the upfront cost and costs that may be hidden, like deductibles

or fees you need to pay each time products are serviced.

What are the limitations? Are there limits on the amounts you can be reimbursed? Is accidental damage covered? Are certain appliances or systems not included? Are there restrictions or fees for cancellation?

Does the claims process seem difficult or slow? Waiting a long time to get paid back can reduce the value of having coverage.

Does the company have a good reputation? A home warranty is only as good as the company responsible for coverage. Search for the name of the company and words like "review" or "complaint" to see if people have had issues in the past.

Did You Know...

Time Zones Were Invented For The Railroad

Before mechanical clocks were invented, people used sundials to tell the time. "Noon" was considered to be when the sun was at its highest point in the sky, due south. As a result, each town and city had its own version of time even after the introduction of mechanical timepieces. With the invention of the transcontinental railroad, however, the lack of standardized time became problematic. As people left one city and traveled by railroad across the country, watches had to be reset frequently to accommodate the different times at each station. To solve this predicament, the United

States borrowed the idea of time zones from Sir Sandford Fleming. A Canadian railroad engineer, Fleming had



originally come up with the idea of dividing the world into 24 different longitudinally based time zones, each with an hourly variation. The United States adopted this idea nationally, creating four different zones based on degrees of longitude. A year later, England, Scotland, and Wales followed suit, and eventually, the rest of the world did too.



Save Lives A Reminder From The Cape

Coral Fire Department

Last month, Cape Coral firefighters responded to a residential structure fire caused by an electrical short in the oven. One of the occupants woke around midnight to do work for their home-based business and found the residence full of smoke. A smoke alarm should have awakened them, but there were none installed. They are fortunate to have needed to wake up for work because, otherwise, without smoke alarms to wake them up and alert them to the fire, the outcome could have been far worse.

These occupants were renters, and according to Florida State Statute, "Unless otherwise agreed in writing, at the commencement of the tenancy of a single-family home or duplex, the landlord shall install working smoke detection devices." In other words, it is the law that the landlord installs smoke alarms in rental units before occupants move in unless it is otherwise agreed in writing. And you should **never** agree to not having smoke alarms installed.

Roughly two out of three fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms, or the alarms are not working. Renting or owning, all residences should have working smoke alarms, with the following in mind:

- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level.
- Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms.
- · Test all smoke alarms at least once a month and replace them when they are 10 years old.

Stop Treating The Blinky Light

Did you know that only about 20% of your nerve fibers transmit signals of pain. You have 31 pairs of spinal nerves running from the base your skull to your tailbone. Each one of these spinal nerves has nine nerve fibers. Only two of these fibers transmits signals of pain which equates to approximately 20%. These nerve fibers are the blinky light. This is why you show up in the doctor's office. This is why you take anti-inflammatories and pain medication. This is even why you get certain treatments or have procedures or injections. It's all to cover up the blinky light; the symptom, the pain, the discomfort. You'd like to keep the light from blinking so that you don't know it's there anymore. The problem is if you cover up the blinking light all the time with a piece of duct tape, your engine is still going to break down. The problem is that the breakdown will be much worse if you keep covering it up.

Well, you may say that's great I get it, but...but I'm in pain and I don't wanna be in pain. That's understandable so let's talk about chronic pain. I describe it to my patients like this. Your chronic pain is a car rolling. And it continues to roll and roll, but it's not rolling because somebody's inside with their foot on the accelerator, no, it's rolling because the brakes are broken. These brakes are the remaining nerve fibers that are not being looked at by most doctors. The brakes are the large diameter afferent nerves that have to do with muscle tone, light touch and balance. And when these brakes are broken or damaged, you will continue to have aches and pain and/or numbness and tingling until you fix the brakes.

This is how my clinic is different. We look at the brakes not just a blinky light. Because we know if we fix the damaged brakes, the blinky light will shut off.
