

Burrowing Owl Festival

Saturday, Feb. 24

The Cape Coral Friends of Wildlife invite you to visit their web page at www.ccfriendsofwildlife.org, for up-to-date information on their 22nd Annual Burrowing Owl Festival which will be held on Saturday, Feb. 24 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Rotary Park, 5505 Rose Garden Road, Cape Coral.

The Florida burrowing owl is classified as state-threatened by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) and Cape Coral is indeed fortunate to have the largest population of Florida burrowing owls of any place in the world. Their burrows are unique in that they are easily accessible via city streets. Although it is wonderful to view these fascinating birds up close, we need to resist the temptation of loving them to death.

To help protect this species of special concern, state and federal laws prohibit the harassment of burrowing owls. This includes throwing rocks at them, trying to catch them, offering food items of any kind, or getting so close that their normal behavior is compromised in any way, especially during nesting season. The nesting season officially runs from Feb. 15 through July 10.

What many people do not realize, especially since Cape Coral's burrowing owls are so prevalent in established neighborhoods, is that your mere presence can adversely affect the well-being of the owls. Although the owls may appear content, or tolerant of your presence, if you are too close, they may be afraid to leave the nest area to hunt for food for their young. If the owls start bobbing their heads, you are already too close. Bobbing their heads is not a way of saying hello, they are getting nervous and want you to back away.

When viewing burrowing owls and taking pictures, do not stay in the area around them for extended periods of time and maintain a minimum distance of 33 feet. Please consider that other people also come from all over the world to view and photograph our burrowing owls. The cumulative effect of too many people, too close, for too long, could be devastating to the young.

Consideration of their needs and well-being will help us to ensure that there are burrowing owls for many generations to come. Informational brochures are available at City Hall, the Cape Coral Historical Museum, local veterinary offices, and the Cape Coral Library. For

Finally, please be considerate of residents' property rights and right to privacy when viewing burrowing owls in Cape Coral. Do not park in residents' yards or driveways or block traffic flow in city streets.

Do Not Stake A Burrow

Please do not stake a burrowing owl burrow without contacting Cape Coral Friends of Wildlife first.

Call before you stake! (239) 980-2593. Burrowing owl burrows can be up to 10 feet in length. Putting stakes around the burrow can damage the burrow and perhaps trap the owls in a crushed burrow.

Burrow Maintenance Program

Every week on Wednesday morning, weather permitting, Cape Coral Friends of Wildlife members perform maintenance on some of the nearly 2,200 burrowing owl burrows located in the city. Armed with

What Are They Building There?

Have you driven around Cape Coral and wondered, "What are they building there?" Well, now you can find out.

When you visit Cape Coral's website, www.capecoral. gov, click the EDO Projects Map link, which will take you to an interactive map to find your answer.

A small window will pop up when you click on a parcel, giving you more information about what is being developed. You'll see the site address, who owns the property, and the zoning code, and under the description, you'll find the answer you are looking for.

Development Projects

- Orange means the project is in review. Staff is reviewing the development application.
- Yellow means the project is approved. Staff has approved and awaiting on conditions to be met.
- **Green** means permit issued. A permit has been issued and work can begin.

Attention Business Owners, A New Law Has Been Adopted **That May Affect Your Business!**

It is extremely important to know that the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN) has implemented a new law for all business owners that hold a C-Corp (1120), S-Corp (1120-S), LLC (Schedule C), or 1065 (Partnership). Starting Jan. 1, businesses are required to file a Beneficial Ownership Information (BOI) form to the U.S. Government to report who ultimately owns and controls the business.

Why do companies have to report beneficial ownership information to the U.S. Department of the **Treasury?** This law creates a new beneficial ownership information reporting requirement as part of the U.S. government's efforts to make it harder for bad actors to hide or benefit from their ill-gotten gains through shell companies or other opaque ownership structures.

When should you report the company's beneficial ownership information to FinCEN? A reporting company created or registered to do business before Jan. 1 will have until Jan. 1, 2025, to file its initial beneficial ownership information report.

A reporting company created or registered on or after Jan. 1 and before Jan. 1, 2025, will have 90 calendar days after receiving notice of the company's creation or registration to file its initial BOI report. This 90-calendar day deadline runs from the time the company receives actual notice that its creation or registration is effective, or after a secretary of state or similar office first provides public notice of its creation or registration, whichever is earlier.

Reporting companies created or registered on or after Jan. 1, 2025, will have 30 calendar days from actual or public notice that the company's creation or registration is effective to file their initial BOI reports with FinCEN.

What companies will be required to report beneficial ownership information to FinCEN? Companies required to report are called reporting companies. There are two types of reporting companies:

- Domestic reporting companies are corporations, limited liability companies, and any other entities created by the filing of a document with a secretary of state or any similar office in the United States.
- Foreign reporting companies are entities (including corporations and limited liability companies) formed under the law of a foreign country that have registered

to do business in the United States by the filing of a document with a secretary of state or any similar office.

Are some companies exempt from the reporting requirement? Yes, 23 types of entities are exempt from the beneficial ownership information reporting requirements. These entities include publicly traded companies meeting specified requirements, many nonprofits, and certain large operating companies.

The following summarizes the 23 exemptions:

- 1. Securities reporting issuer
- 2. Governmental authority
- 3. Bank
- 4. Credit Union
- 5. Depository institution holding company
- 6. Money services business
- 7. Broker or dealer in securities
- 8. Securities exchange or clearing agency
- 9. Other Exchange Act registered entity
- 10. Investment company or investment adviser
- 11. Venture capital fund advisor
- 12. Insurance company
- 13. State-licensed insurance producer
- 14. Commodity Exchange Act registered entity
- 15. Accounting firm
- 16. Public utility

- 17. Financial market utility
- 18. Pooled investment vehicle
- 19. Tax-exempt entity
- 20. Entity assisting a tax-exempt entity
- 21. Large operating company
- 22. Subsidiary of certain exempt entity
- 23. Inactive entity

What penalties do individuals face for violating BOI reporting requirements? As specified in the Corporate Transparency Act, a person who willfully violates the BOI reporting requirements may be subject to civil penalties of up to \$500 for each day that the violation continues. That person may also be subject to criminal penalties of up to two years imprisonment and a fine of up to \$10,000. Potential violations include willfully failing to file a beneficial ownership information report, willfully filing false beneficial ownership information, or willfully failing to correct or update previously reported beneficial ownership information.

Be sure to mention to your tax advisor that your business might need to file a BOI form to avoid serious civil penalties.



Girl Scout Cookie Season Is Here!

Five years after Juliette Gordon Low founded the Girl Scouts in 1912, young girls (with the help of their mothers) begin baking cookies at home and selling them to support their troop activities.

In July of 1922, a magazine titled *The American Girl*, published by the Girl Scouts, printed a recipe for a shortbread cookie with the suggestion that these be sold for fundraisers. It was estimated that the cost of the ingredients was 26 to 36 cents for six or seven dozen. Throughout the coming years Girl Scouts made simple sugar cookies at home, packaged them in wax paper with a sticker, and sold them door to door for 25 to 35 cents per dozen.

Girl Scouts sell cookies each year as a fundraiser to support camping trips, STEM projects and entrepreneurial pursuits among other activities. Selling season is January through April. Cookie season already began in Southwest Florida on Jan. 3. If you know a Girl Scout, they can purchase cookies online for you; otherwise cookies will be sold at booths.

Gulf American purchased property for the first school on the Cape at 4519 Vincennes Blvd. It cost \$347,000 to build and opened in 1964. The school had

12 classrooms and six teachers for the 212 students who showed up for class on the first day. Richard Ahern was the first principal. When the school opened, part of it, including the principal's office, was still under construction. Ahern used boxes to create a makeshift desk in an unused classroom. The school grew quickly. By 1975, there were 26 classrooms, and the student population was booming.



Here's How

If you own a home/condo in Lee County:

• Stop by the library front desk (at any of the 13 libraries in Lee County).



• The staff will confirm property ownership by looking up your name in the property appraiser's database. For you to get a free card your name must be listed on the property.

• You get a free library card – ta! da!

If you are **renting** in Lee County for a few weeks or a few months:

- Stop by the library front desk and request a visitor's card.
- Give the library staff your out-of-state driver's license or state identification card.
- Pay \$15 for a three month visitor's card (three months is the minimum).
- The staff will issue you a library card good for three months- ta! da!

And ... if you are renting for only two months for example, you can still view the library's databases and download books and music **remotely** when you go back up north, for that last month that you paid for.








The New Math:

Stop Treating The Blinky Light

Did you know that only about 20% of your nerve fibers transmit signals of pain. You have 31 pairs of spinal nerves running from the base your skull to your tailbone. Each one of these spinal nerves has nine nerve fibers. Only two of these fibers transmits signals of pain which equates to approximately 20%. These nerve fibers are the blinky light.
