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Cape Coral Opens Civitas:

A New Era Of Affordable Workforce Housing

Cape Coral has officially opened its first workforce-based housing community, Civitas of Cape Coral, marking a significant step in addressing the city's growing need for affordable housing. The 96-unit development, located off Pine Island Road, provides essential housing options for individuals and families earning 80% or less of the area median income (AMI).

A Much-Needed Solution To Rising Housing Costs

With skyrocketing rental prices across Southwest Florida, many residents have struggled to find affordable places to live. Civitas offers a solution, with rental rates as low as \$634 per month for certain units, and prices ranging up to \$1,800 for three-bedroom apartments. Each unit is equipped with a washer and dryer, ensuring modern

conveniences for residents.

To qualify for Civitas, applicants must meet specific income and household size requirements. For example, a three-person household earning no more than \$25,000 annually could secure a one-bedroom unit for as low as \$634 per month. Meanwhile, a similar unit for someone earning \$41,000 might cost closer to \$1,400 per month.

"Good. Because we need it. The housing prices are way too high for anybody to survive," said Cape Coral

resident Christine Heerlyn. "You can't live off of less than \$100,000 here."

A Modern, Amenity-Rich Community

Civitas is more than just an affordable housing project – it is a thoughtfully designed residential enclave spanning 4.65 acres. The community consists of three three-story concrete residential buildings, constructed to meet NGBS Green Building certification standards.

The unit mix includes nine one-bedroom, 57 two-bedroom, and 30 three-bedroom apartments. Residents have access to a 6,100-square-foot clubhouse featuring a fitness center, business center, and a swimming pool. Additionally, Civitas offers free programs, including an Employment Assistance Program and a Financial Management Program, to support residents in achieving economic stability.

The Collaborative Effort Behind Civitas

Civitas is the result of a public-private partnership between the Lee County Housing Authority, ReVital Development Group, and Birdsong Housing Partners. The development received financial support from various entities, including \$5.6 million in state hurricane relief funds, \$1.1 million from the City of Cape Coral, and \$2 million from Lee County.

"It's exciting. It's overwhelming," said Michael Allen, President of ReVital Development Group. "We're happy to finally see the vision come to reality and provide housing for hard-working families in Cape Coral."

Meeting The Demand For Affordable Housing

The need for affordable housing in Cape Coral has never been greater. At the Civitas pre-leasing event, hundreds of hopeful applicants camped out overnight, eager to secure a unit.

Mark Brady, a local resident who currently sleeps in his



car, expressed his urgency for housing options like Civitas. "I'm disabled. I collect Social Security, about \$23,000 to \$24,000 a year, and that is it," he said. While he was unable to qualify in time for Civitas, he remains hopeful as the city plans more developments.

Cape Coral City Councilor Jennifer Nelson-Lastra emphasized the importance of these projects: "When they're starting teachers, law enforcement officers, or first responders ... their salary is not of that median range. It's a huge issue."

District 5 Councilmember Joseph Kilraine echoed similar sentiments: "People think of low-income housing as something that's not very prestigious. But if you look at this facility and what they offer – it's unbelievable. It's a great asset to have in the city."

Looking Ahead: More Affordable Housing On The Horizon

The completion of Civitas is just the beginning. Developers are already planning an additional 160 affordable housing units in North Fort Myers, with future projects also being considered in Cape Coral.

"That's definitely the goal – to show that it can be done, how it can be done, and that it's well received by the community and local government," Allen said. "We have our next development in Cape Coral planned as well, about a mile down the road for seniors. We'll continue to focus here in Cape Coral and Lee County, and grow."

As Cape Coral continues to expand, developments like Civitas provide much-needed stability for residents, ensuring they can live where they work and contribute to a thriving, diverse community.

AquaShine Express: More Than Just Another Car Wash

Car washes may seem to flock to Cape Coral like birds to a pile of French fries – but not all car washes are created equal. Take it from Jade Leone, general manager of the newly opened AquaShine Express Car Wash on Nicholas Parkway.

"It has a friendly atmosphere," Leone says of the car wash that celebrated its grand opening on Jan. 31 after a soft launch in mid-December. "Everyone is very happy to help."

A personal greeter is stationed to welcome every driver before their car enters the high-tech Express Tunnel system. Other employees are on hand to provide assistance in the site area, which offers the free use of vacuums, glass cleaner and towels with every wash.

The site area is also where employees are able to build relationships with customers.

"You get to know new faces, new people," says employee Jeremiah Higgins of his favorite part of the job. "You become friends."

Other employees, like Jacob Hernandez, are equally enthusiastic about different aspects.

"I like seeing the wraps go off," he says of the rotating brushes that clean the back, front and sides of the vehicle. And who wouldn't?

Brand-new and made of neoprene, the wraps don't trap dirt like old-school cloth wraps. The wraps are combined with the pH-balanced soaps, wax and sealant options, making the wash gentle enough to get your car cleaned as frequently as you wish.

The entire tunnel is thoroughly cleaned at the close of every day, and the tunnel tested with a drive-through of Jade's Audi every morning.

"I'm OCD," she laughs, which is a perfect trait to bring to a place specializing in vehicle cleanliness. She was also able to bring ideal employees to AquaShine, hiring everyone who works there. Some of them were recruited from two competing car washes, where Jade had worked in management capacities.

The 20-year-old is already building her career in the car wash industry, citing things like confusion and unfair

practices as the reasons she left the other car washes behind. She enjoys the industry for the opportunity to learn and grow.

Cape Coral's growth is what prompted AquaShine to open shop here, along with our strong economy and high-traffic areas. While the car wash is owned by a private equity company headquartered in North Carolina, the facility itself has a local community feel.

Additional perks include unlimited monthly wash packages, convenient license plate recognition entry, and, in the higher-tiered packages, a tire shine option that Jade says has been a customer favorite since the get-go. A bugremover gel is coming soon.

Monthly subscribers can get unlimited washes from any of the AquaShine locations. Four are up and running in Georgia and South Carolina, and others are planned for the Florida cities of Sarasota, Orlando, and Melbourne.

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Book Review: Like Mother, Like Mother By Susan Rieger

Susan Rieger's latest novel, Like Mother, Like Mother is an intricate exploration of family secrets, generational trauma, and the complex bonds between mothers and daughters. Set initially in 1960s Detroit, this compelling narrative weaves together the stories of three generations of strong-willed women whose




lives are profoundly shaped by buried family history.

The story begins with a haunting premise: two-year-old Lila Pereira's life is upended when her abusive father has her mother committed to an asylum. This traumatic event sets in motion a multigenerational saga that examines how trauma, resilience, and identity ripple through time. Rieger handles these heavy themes with remarkable sensitivity and nuance, creating a narrative that is both emotionally resonant and intellectually engaging.

The novel's greatest strength lies in the character development. The writing is brilliant in its portrayal of complex, flawed characters who feel authentically human in their struggles and aspirations. Each woman in the story grapples with her own demons while navigating the delicate balance between personal ambition and family obligations. Rieger particularly excels at examining the tension between career ambitions and family

responsibilities, a theme that resonates strongly in today's context.

The author's writing style is sophisticated yet accessible. While the prose can be considered "highbrow" it remains deeply engaging, pulling readers into the story from the first page. Rieger's background as a Colombia University Law School graduate and former Associate Provost brings a sharp analytical edge



to her storytelling, while never sacrificing emotional depth. Her prose is sharp and efficient, matching the journalistic background of her protagonist.

The novel excels in its exploration of themes including family dynamics, marriage, ambition, and motherhood. The *Kirkus Reviews* praises it as "both snappy and sprawling, psychologically sharp," noting how successfully it captures both cultural and political details of its various time periods. The author's careful attention to historical context enriches the narrative without overwhelming it.

However, potential readers should be aware that the novel deals with some challenging subject matter. As some reviewers note, there are trigger warnings for certain content, particularly in the backstory. While these elements are handled with care, they may be difficult for sensitive readers.

The novel has been praised for being "immersive" and "powerful" in its portrayal of families lost and found, broken and irreparable. Rieger's ability to maintain narrative tension while exploring deep psychological territories is impressive. The story "held readers' hearts from the very first page," according to Fresh Fiction, a testament to its emotional impact.

What makes *Like Mother, Like Mother* particularly noteworthy is its refusal to offer easy answers or neat resolutions. Instead, it presents an examination of how family histories shape us, sometimes in ways we don't fully understand. The novel proves especially compelling for readers interested in nuanced portrayals of family, identity, and enduring questions about what it means to be shaped by our past.

In conclusion, *Like Mother*; *Like Mother* is a masterfully crafted novel that succeeds on multiple levels: as a family saga, as a psychological study, and as a commentary on motherhood and identity. While it may challenge readers with its subject matter, the rewards of engaging with this thoughtful and beautifully written work far outweigh any difficulties. It's a significant achievement in contemporary literary fiction that will resonate with readers long after they've turned the final page.

Cape Coral For The Children

Transforming Lives Through Hope, Education, And **Community Support**

Cape Coral for the Children (CCFC) was started in 2012 and founded by Julie Lombardi after hearing a 17-year-old's story at a Do the Right Thing



recognition. The teen lived day-to-day with the help of a friend and slept at various homes when possible. His father was incarcerated, and his mother deceased. Despite his hardships, he maintained a 4.0 GPA while holding a job and was accepted into college.

Telling friends about this experience prompted the thought that something had to be done about children in Cape Coral who need help because of their being classified under the McKinney/Vento Act as homeless under Project Access.

The Federal McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance act states that children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence are considered homeless. If, due to a loss of housing, a child must live in a shelter, motel, vehicle, or campground, on the street, in abandoned buildings, or doubled-up with relatives or friends, he/she is eligible to receive service provided under the McKinney Vento Act.

When CCFC was founded in 2012 there were approximately 300 children who lived in Cape Coral and qualified for assistance under the McKinney Vento Act. Today the number of children is 424.

Working with Lee County Social Service Agency in the local school system, CCFC learned that the schools and teachers provide students with dignity by opening the schools early in the morning and having toiletries available for the children to clean up prior to the school day. Thus, there is a need for toiletry products of all kinds, so CCFC collects products from the community and delivers them to the Lee School system.

Thus began the first of several programs: the school children's toiletry program and the scholarship program.

Wanting to do more, CCFC was incorporated as a 501(c)(3) charity and decided to raise money to provide scholarships for students who were dealing with a family situation that required financial assistance to attend college or technical school to further their education.

Cape Coral for the Children started out giving \$500 scholarships, then to \$700, and the last few years, the nonprofit was able to distribute seven \$1,000 scholarships to Cape Coral high school students who qualified. To date the organization has awarded \$72,000 in scholarships.

Cape Coral for the Children's main fundraiser takes place each fall with a fashion show where all proceeds go towards funding scholarships. Non-paid volunteers fully run the charity organization; Cape Coral for the Children also hosts a luncheon on the second Wednesday of each month where participating establishments provide gift cards for the charity to raffle off at the fashion show.



On Sunday, Feb. 23, Cape Coral for the Children will host a Bingo/Basket fundraiser. This event will be held at Rusty's Grill in Cape Coral, doors will open at noon with bingo games starting at 1 p.m. Advance tickets to play bingo can be purchased online at www. capecoralforthechildren.org. Advance tickets are \$20 for 10 games. If purchased at the door, tickets will be \$25.

As a volunteer organization being able to make a difference in the lives of children struggling and living an atypical lifestyle is what makes it worth the many hours dedicated to the programs sponsored by Cape Coral for the Children. It is all about the needs of children.

Footopic: The Art Of Custom Shoemaking Is Alive And Well In The Cape

The next time you're hankering for a pair of perfectly



fitted shoes made out of, say, stingray leather, Footopic is the place to get them. In fact, you can dream up just about any shoe style or color and Footopic owner Chris Hoppenworth would be glad to do his best to create them just for you.

A small handful of shoemakers may still exist throughout the nation, but Footopic is one of the few where everything is 100 percent handmade. Handed down through four generations, Chris's business opened in downtown Cape Coral in August 2024 – a mere month after his family of four moved from Hanover, Germany.

And it's not just the outer looks that make his shoes special. It's the high-quality materials, the skill, talent and experience that goes into making them, and, of course, the precise measurements and anatomical expertise that makes slipping on his custom shoes or insoles akin to slipping into a little bit of heaven.

"Seeing a smile on the customer's face from the pain-free feeling" is one of Chris's favorite aspects of his profession. By the time many of the customers get to his shop, they've been to four or five other places seeking relief from feet problems and pain.

"I was the guy who was able to help," says Chris, holder of a German Meisterbrief – the equivalent of a master's degree – in the field. The intense study ensured high-end knowledge of all the inner workings and functions of all the anatomical structures in the legs and feet.

Unlike the majority of today's one-size-fits all, subpar disposable items, the custom shoes and insoles from Footopic are crafted to be one-of-a-kind specifically for the dimensions and unique characteristics of your feet. They are also crafted to last.

His insoles come with a lifetime warranty and six months of free adjustments.

A typical visit starts with a 15- to 30-minute measurement and question session where Chris diagnoses the problem behind the discomfort. He then explains his proposed solution and, if the customer agrees, he creates the custom insoles in 72 hours or less.

The quick turnaround comes from his dedication. And the fact that he has a fully equipped workshop on the premises. The only shop Chris found in the United States that could do something similar was in California – and their turnaround time was four weeks or more because they had to send away the measurements for creation overseas.

Custom shoes take a bit longer to create, depending on the complexity and materials of the shoe. Seven of the main steps are illustrated in a poster behind the shop's front counter.

"It's really more like 50 steps," Chris explains, "but there wasn't room on the poster." Some steps can also take days if they require time for the hand-cut leather to dry and take proper shape.

Customers are apt to say the custom shoes are worth the wait, as are Chris's wife Julia and their two daughters, eight-year-old Viktoria and six-year-old Mathilda. Chris and Julia first met in 2009. The two moved in together three weeks later, marrying in 2012. (Yes, he made her shoes for the wedding.)

The family decided to move out of Germany as they watched its public schools decline and changes in the public health system policies impact the shoemaking business. Chris

pulled out a map, put it on the table, and went through it with Julia using the process of elimination. The United States quickly became the desired location.

Florida beat out the West Coast for its lack of earthquakes. Cape Coral rose to the top as Chris had been a frequent visitor to his friend's house here. The city was also attractive for its low crime rates, good education, affordable cost of living – and absence of skyscrapers.

"I love that you can always see the sun," Chris says. The Cape also has a big enough customer base for the business to thrive.

First established in Hanover in 1925, the company's first owner was Mr. Emde. Mr. Schulze then purchased the business in 1963. Chris's father bought the company in 1992, selling it to his son in 2011.

While Chris was raised in a shoemaker's family, it wasn't something he had always been thrilled about doing.

"I hated it," he says of his first years working at the shoe shop with his father. As the boss's son, he was subjected to extra-long hours, extra-tedious tasks – and absolutely no favoritism. Chris left shoemaking for a spell to spend 10 months in the German army. He came back to dad's shop for two more years,

until the two once again started bickering.

Chris then worked for other shoemakers but was drawn back to dad's business when his mom contacted him to

mend fences. Dad's health was declining. He couldn't work as long and hard as he used to.

By the time Chris was ready to make dad an offer for the business, he had already spent five years as a journeyman to earn a college degree in the shoemaking trade, along with another nine months as a full-time student earning his German Meisterbrief.

Chris insisted on a full-out purchase of the business so his dad would have funds to retire, and Chris would have leeway to make the radical changes he wanted.

One of the first was to computerize all the prescriptions and other paperwork. He then made adjustments involving the suppliers and useful technology—like trading the 1980s-era cash register for a digital payment system.

He also updated the look and feel of the shop. "It looked like Walgreens," Chris says of his dad's shop with all the ready-made, off-the-shelf foot-related products that he eliminated to focus solely on custom insoles and shoes.


Of course, the move from Hanover to Cape Coral was another huge change in the business, especially since it took more than eight weeks for all the heavy shoemaking equipment to arrive on a cargo ship.

One thing that will never change is the hands-on care, dedication and craftsmanship that remains the heartbeat of the business.

"When I started out, I hated this job," Chris says. "But 10 years later, and after getting my master's degree, I realized my dad taught me so well. My passion now comes from doing it with such a high degree of knowledge. It became a passion, and I could not imagine doing anything else."

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


Before allowing children to climb trees or caring for trees

Never attempt to trim trees near power lines or remove branches that are in contact with them. Certified tree professionals have the necessary training and equipment to safely manage vegetation around high-voltage lines.



Plant Smart, Stay Safe

Planning your landscaping with safety in mind is crucial. As a rule of thumb, plant trees expected to grow taller than 20 feet at least 20 feet away from power lines. For a list of trees suitable for planting near electric lines, visit www.lcec.net.





Catch The Action

February On The Water

Waters around Cape Coral and Southwest Florida afford us a choice of fishing opportunities as we move towards the close of winter with spring in sight. While some fish are completing their spawning duties, others are just beginning. February will bring us cold days followed with a warming trend. By the later part of the month, cold days should become less numerous, followed with a rise in water temperature.

The winter run of sheepsheads will peak as the larger fish complete their spawning duties. Sheepshead school around structure with a good tidal flow inshore, around the beaches, and nearshore. They are the one fish that thrives in the cold with the best bite often coming over the coldest days. Sheepshead are one of Florida's tastiest fish and get a good deal of attention from anglers fishing from boat and land. Public docks, piers, and bridges offer excellent sheepshead fishing for shore bound anglers; however, many were damaged or destroyed from the last couple years of hurricanes.

As the month passes, warming waters and the return of schooling baitfish will mark the beginning to some of the largest sea trout of the year. Large trout are locally known as "gators" or "gator trout" and exceed well over 20 inches, often pushing 30 inches. They are moving onto the inshore grass flats, as well as oyster bars, and deeper holes. Sea trout are sight feeders and prefer water with good clarity. These larger fish are often egg laden as we approach their spawning season and should be handled with care and released after a good battle.

The snook bite should fire off with the return of baitfish and warming waters. In my opinion, snook are our top inshore sportfish. I am often asked, "If you could only target one fish what would it be?" Snook is always my answer. They strike hard, fight hard, and have the natural instinct to head to the nearest structure and break off. Large or small they are a blast to catch, full of tenacity, and just a cool fish. It's easy to get addicted and catch snook fever. Snook are ambush feeders that are found around island points, oyster bars, sand holes near islands, and structures such as docks, bridges, and pier pilings and riprap. During the cooler months most of the saltwater canals in the Cape are a good bet to hold snook. Snook season is closed through February.

While redfish tolerate the cold, their numbers and appetite increase as winter nears its end. They range in size from

little guys barely a foot long to well over 30 inches. While snook have fast blazing runs, dramatic leaps from the water, and head for the nearest structure, redfish are in a different category. They fight like a bull, not fast but super strong and don't know the word quit. They will fight hard from start to finish. Redfish are found in the areas previously mentioned for sheepshead, sea trout, and snook, as well as under mangrove overhangs on the higher stages of tides. Anglers also choose to sight fish reds as they are tailing and pushing a wake as they hunt for prey over the shallow flats. Negative low tides offer the best opportunities, particularly early morning, and late afternoon.

In the waters of the Gulf of Mexico, fish are on the move as they follow the rising water temperature north. Often just a few miles off the beach. King and Spanish mackerel plus bonito or false albacore are off the coast and often in large schools. Watch for feeding birds to locate the hungry fish. Cobia, a local favorite, which is often mistaken for a shark due to its similar appearance, may show up at any time around your boat offshore or inshore. Bottom fishing around reefs could yield a variety including sheepsheads, various snapper, grouper, permit, and flounder to name a few. Also, keep an eye open for triple tail sunning on their side around floating objects.

The transition from late winter into early spring can offer some of the best fishing the area offers as days get longer and water temperatures rise. Of course, we can expect a couple more cool fronts before month's end that will affect the bite and fishing conditions, but spring is just around the corner. To keep up with current fishing regulations, you can go to www.myfwc.com or download the Fish Rules app for the latest rules and regulations.



Remember When... The Mail Was Delivered By Boat?

In 1959, Cape Coral was at the dirt end of nowhere. So how were people supposed to get mail? Like everything else, the resourceful pioneers of this Waterfront Wonderland sorted out the mail issue quite well.



Right across the river, within a block of the Fort Myers yacht basin, was the post office (the Sidney & Berne Davis Art Center today), so, obviously, the quickest way to get mail to the heart of Cape Coral was straight across the river. By boat.

The first delivery was on Oct. 21, 1959. Captain Ladd brought the mail over on the Santiva (so named for the islands he served originally). Nearly everybody in Cape Coral was there to meet the boat. Excitement ran high. Cape Postmaster Joe Bradford stepped forward to accept the small bundle and, one imagines, was accompanied by the citizens of Cape Coral back to his cubbyhole in the Surfside Restaurant that was the Cape's first post office.

The Santiva arrived around 9:30 a.m., depending on whether the Cape's doctor, who liked to fish, was aboard. Dr. David visited the Cape medical clinic once a week and could not resist the opportunity to get in a little fishing on the way over.

The Santiva also doubled as a sight-seeing boat. Early Cape residents, eager to get to know their exotic surroundings, could

ride along to see the island stops, which included Pine Island, Sanibel, and Captiva. On the way back to Fort Myers, the Santiva would drop them off and pick up the outgoing mail. For passengers boarding at Fort Myers, the 75-mile round-trip cruise cost \$3.30.

The last Santiva mail delivery to the Cape Coral yacht basin was in February of 1963, one week after the Gulf American Land Corporation (GALC) opened the Cape's first post office building on 47th Terrace. The following December, Captain Ladd retired and put the Santiva up for sale. Bridges to the Cape and the islands were under way.

Since its inception in 1987, the Cape Coral Museum of History has sought to discover, preserve, and share the history of Cape Coral through its archives, museum exhibits, and public programs. The museum is the official repository for the history of Cape Coral and serves as a public resource for all sectors of the local community, as well as international and U.S. tourists. Operated by the Cape Coral Historical Society, the museum exhibits artifacts, documents, and photographs pertaining to the history of Cape Coral and Southwest Florida.

Hours: Closed Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday. Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, 10 a.m. to 2

Admission: Adults \$10, \$5 for 62 and over, \$5 for military, \$3 for students, children 5 and under free.




Sharing A Home: Romance Or Risky Business?

just kick them out and you may have to take legal action to remove them from the property.


